How to make winged horses, wizards and wondrous things feel right at home in your writing. Lesley offers tips and techniques for effectively grounding the fantastical elements in your stories while still letting them take flight. She will share insights into worldbuilding, crafting convincing dialogue and action, and how to practically incorporate the five senses in your writing to help create rich, exciting and

resonant tales of your own.

> Your Story in the Future Visualize vourself in the future, in ten, twenty, one hundred years. What will your world look like? What do you foresee? What can you

imagine? First, we will create a visual vocabulary by brainstorming and exploring the visual elements of the future: the landscapes, the technologies, everyday objects, clothing and pets, through a series of pencil sketches. Then, using all or some of the

elements that you created, you will tell us the story

of your future in one, or a series of images.

Suspense We read for empathy. We want to walk a mile in someone else's shoes. This is probably our most deeply human characteristic. But in order for there to be story, there has to be some kind of threat.

There have to be stakes. Something has to

happen to come between the protagonist's fondest desire and their achievement of it. Suspense is what keeps us turning pages. Suspense is where action runs headlong into uncertainty. So that's what we're going to look at, talk about and write about. Will it work? I don't know - the suspense is killing me!

Tim Wynne-Jones has written 37 books for people of all ages. He has won The Governor General's Award twice and been short-listed six times. He has also won the Boston Globe-Horn Book Award twice, the Arthur Ellis Award of the Crime Writers of Canada, twice, and the Edgar Award presented by the Mystery Writers of America, once. His books have been translated into a dozen languages. He was made an Officer of the Order of Canada in 2012.
