Letter from the Chair of the **Board**

If I were to choose a word that expresses the work that has been done at MASC in 2020 -2021, I would say consolidation. Each day of the past year seemed to involve a step forward into a new level of maturity for MASC. An Equity and Diversity Policy was formulated and enacted. An Indigenous Advisory Committee was created. A Cultural Appropriation Policy was adopted. Twenty-eight performances were filmed, becoming popular Videos On Demand programming in schools and community settings. New partnerships were explored to expand MASC's reach throughout Canada.

It was bittersweet as Wendy Hartley transitioned from her role as Co-Executive Director to Executive Consultant at the end of June. But it was thrilling to watch ED Micheline Shoebridge embrace that complex role and continue to lead the staff through the turbulent waters of the pandemic. New staff were welcomed to our virtual offices, and it was exciting to witness them build a cohesive team - especially considering some of them have never met face to face!

At the Board level, too, we have welcomed strong new members with diverse skills. We have begun work on creating new Governance Documents that will quide MASC forward for many years to come.

All in all, the year has seen a consolidation of vision as MASC's Strategic Plan becomes a reality.

MASC is definitely building a solid foundation for the next 30 years. And that is certainly something to celebrate!



People

Artists: MASC works with a roster of close to 60 professional artists and artist groups, totalling 140 individual artists. Our artists represent a wide diversity of people from a variety of cultural backgrounds – including Indigenous peoples, people of colour, and immigrants/newcomers – as well as members from the disability community, the 2SLGBTQIA community, and other equity-seeking communities. More than half of our roster artists offer workshops and performances in both English and French. An additional 60 artists were employed this year for various events and festivals, making a total of 200 individual artists that MASC worked with in 2020-21.

Participants: Over 200,000 child, youth, and adults, including seniors.

Volunteers: 20 volunteers contributed 1204 hours supporting our events and providing office support.

School Partners: MASC is fortunate to work with over 240 schools across Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec. Our online programming has allowed us to reach further afield, growing our school board partners from an average of 14 to 24 English and French school boards in 2020-21. This expansion led to 56 schools outside our region booking MASC programs. We are proud to say MASC is now working with all 12 French school boards in Ontario, reaching small francophone communities in the south and north of the province. In 2020-21, MASC offered programming in 20 school boards outside our region. In all, MASC programming reached 205,000 students across Canada.

Community Partners: MASC worked in close partnership with 58 community partners locally including community centres, libraries, seniors' venues, childcare centres and more. Working alongside our community partners, we provide programming that engages their community.

Programs

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MASC is committed to offering professional artistic and cultural experiences to children, youth, adults and seniors. MASC offers equitable access to those living in underserved neighbourhoods and rural communities. By bringing artists into communities, MASC reduces economic barriers through subsidized programming as well as removes institutional barriers by providing community members access to professional arts programming where they live and go to school. MASC brings the arts to the people.

MASC Online: MASC is proud to have offered online programming to schools and communities across Canada since May 2020. Over 200 programs, including workshops, performances, residencies and 28 professionally filmed Videos-On-Demand, are offered virtually and continue to be available across all artistic disciplines in both English and French.

School Program: Building on the legacy that started 31 years ago, the MASC School Program has expanded its reach across the province and even across the country.

In addition to the 358 programs across the 6 artistic disciplines, MASC now offers specialized programs in partnership with school boards providing opportunities for students to explore cross-disciplinary curriculum-based subjects through an arts and culture lens. Through experience and reflection, students learn about diverse topics, including Indigenous Studies, Natural Sciences, Cultural and Social Studies, and co-develop with MASC artists an aesthetic interpretation resulting in beautiful murals, engaging videos, live performances and more.

PassepART is a micro-grant program managed by the Fédération culturelle canadiennefrançaise (FCCF). In 2020-2021, MASC implemented over 100 PassepART projects using over \$100,000 in grants. We reached nearly 27,000 students with 513 workshops, 110 performances and 23 virtual residencies across Ontario.

Drôle de Fonds LP Dion Louis-Philippe Dion was a great advocate for the Franco-Ontarian artistic community. In his honour, his family and community have raised over \$6,000 to enable MASC to organize virtual arts programming in francophone schools.

Programs

Places

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In-person programming offered across Eastern Ontario & Western Quebec **Online programming** offered across Canada Programs are offered in Schools, Community Settings, and Seniors Venues

Community Program: MASC delivered a variety of arts programming to more than 12,500 children, youth, and adults, including seniors, in English and French in diverse and underserved communities across Ottawa and surrounding areas. Programming ranged from workshop series to performances with 58 community venues for programs of all ages. MASC offered 2800 seniors artistic programming in partnership with 22 seniors venues, ranging from online programming to safe at-a-distance dance workshops and mural creation.

Awesome Arts: In 2021, MASC offered a simplified version of Awesome Arts for 60 participants in partnership with the Sandy Hill Community Health Centre and Viscount Alexander Public School. Arts Network Ottawa supported two internships: Suzan Richards with intern Joy Mwandemange and Claudia Salguero with intern Edgar Hernandez. The latter duo worked with young participants to co-create a mural titled the future awaits that was displayed at the Ottawa Art Gallery for two months following a public vernissage and was eventually installed in the Strathcona Heights neighbourhood.



Events

Tarbana Come / Indian



On April 17th 2021, MASC held the first-ever virtual edition of the MASC Young Authors and Illustrators Festival, led by Artistic Director Faith Seltzer. Students in grades six to eight signed up for a day of literary

activities including artist presentations and hands-on master classes. Hosted by JustJamaal ThePoet, the event also included a game of Truth of Lie with the six authors and illustrators, as well as the opportunity to create a spoken word poem as a group. The festival is planning another virtual edition in April 2022.

IllustrAuteurs

In February 2021, MASC held virtually for the first time its brand-new literary festival IllustrAuteurs. This festival introduces students to different types of writing, literature and illustrations. IllustrAuteurs succeeded in attracting 100 participants from over 15 different regions of French Ontario.

MASC Young Authors & Allustrators Festival

Festival de danse en milieu scolaire (FDMS)

The 6th edition of FDMS took place virtually in March 2021 with 72 participants and 20 professional dancers, choreographers and artistic directors. FDMS will return in March 2022 with a new virtual edition.



Strategic Plan

MASC's 5 Key Priorities In September 2020, the MASC Board of Directors adopted a new 5-year Strategic Plan. Five key priorities were identified by the Board and MASC is dedicated to developing them in a variety of ways.

Artistic and Program Excellence Development of the virtual program that we piloted in the spring. We now have more than 200 programs that are offered online, including 28 Videos on Demand. MASC developed a variety of new artist-in-residencies that we offer in partnership with schools, allowing students to explore cross-disciplinary curriculum-based subjects through an arts and culture lens.

Equity, Diversity and Inclusion MASC created Equity and Diversity as well as Cultural Appropriation policies and established an Indigenous Advisory Committee who reviewed all Indigenous programming and provided recommendations which we followed.

To ensure equitable access to MASC programming, we raised \$238,000 in funding for subsidies for, and projects in, underserved communities.

Visibility

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MASC undertook steps to increase visibility resulting in more significant impact in the community, including:

- Hired a Communications Director in September 2020
- Secured media coverage for several of our online and 'at a distance' programming
- Secured a partnership with Apt613 and Le Pressoir to do features on all MASC artists
- Secured a grant to redo our website (to be completed in 2021-22)
- Increased our social media presence by an average of 54%

Sustainability

MASC maintained support from municipal and provincial governments as well as foundations and benefited from COVID supports. MASC also experienced an increase in individual donations. MASC secured a four-year federal operational grant from Canada Council for the Arts that began in 2020-21. MASC experienced a slight increase in earned revenue and secured more than \$130,000 in project and event funding to grow partnerships and programming opportunities across the city.

Leadership

MASC is dedicated to enhancing the capacities of our staff and Board of Directors. To that end, in 2020-21, we:

- Offered multiple professional development opportunities for staff.
- Drafted a new Governance Policy for the Board of Directors.
- Created a number of policies. (please refer to Equity, Diversity and Inclusion section for details).



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MASC's 31st year was one to remember! We spent the year in awe of the creativity and dedication of our staff, our artists, our school and community partners as well as our Board of Directors. We spent the year in awe of the creativity and dedication of our staff, our artists, and our school and community partners, as well as our Board of Directors. The support we received from our funders was nothing short of miraculous and has ensured that MASC will weather these challenging times and be in a position of strength for many years to come. The many changes that have occurred at MASC over the past two years are not something anyone could have predicted, but we couldn't be prouder of how MASC has responded.

Our team's efforts were paid off in the over 200,000 people who benefitted from our programs, the more than 200 professional artists with whom we had the privilege of working. MASC expanded our community partners locally and reached schools in all corners of Ontario and even across the country, from Toronto to Vancouver to Yellowknife!

MASC brings arts to the people, and in that spirit, we are pleased to have allocated \$238,000 in subsidies, reducing the cost of 800 workshops and 189 performances, ensuring that MASC programming is accessible to as many people as possible. In addition to our subsidized programs, MASC offers free programming through our annual Awesome Arts program, held in partnership with underserved communities.

MASC is dedicated to our Strategic Plan's five key priorities but in 2020-21 we put a particular emphasis on Equity, Diversity and Inclusion. We are so grateful to our Indigenous partners who have helped MASC create an Indigenous program policy and cultural protocols as well as establish an Indigenous Advisory Committee. Additionally, we are pleased to have a new Cultural Appropriation Policy and Equity and Diversity Policy.

2020-21 was also a year of change. After 20 years with MASC, Wendy Hartley stepped down from her role as Co-Executive Director. Wendy's dedication, warmth, support and vision have been key to MASC's success. For these reasons, and many more, we are delighted that Wendy remains connected to MASC, bringing her experience and insight as an Executive Consultant.

We look forward to growing with you and continuing to bring the arts to your schools and communities!
